Students leaving Weston Secondary School will “have acquired and developed the employability skills and experience which businesses and higher institutions value”.

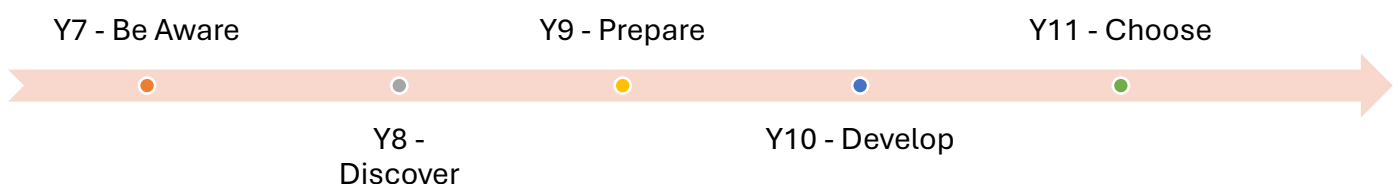
Year 7 - An introduction to careers education. Raising student’s **awareness** of a wide range of careers and pathways. Identifying careers preferences based on areas of interest or suitability.

Year 8 - Students **discover** various careers options and their career pathways that match their interest and suitability. Students have an understanding of LMI and the experiences and qualifications that support specific career pathways.

Year 9 - Students make decisions about GCSE options that have clear link to careers in **preparation** for future progression and post 16 choices.

Year 10 - Students refine their career aspirations and recognise the next steps. Students **develop** their knowledge and employability skills.

Year 11 - Students make smart **choices** about their post 16 career pathways making plans for colleges, training providers and apprenticeships.

Students explore setting ambitious targets and personal goals, alongside reflecting on their aspirations for the future	Summer 2

Year 8	When
Students learn about income and expenditure, budgeting, tax, different types of bank accounts, and an introduction to cryptocurrency.	Summer 1

Year 9	When
Students investigate different pathways for future learning, including further education (FE), higher education (HE), and apprenticeships. They also discuss the benefits of lifelong learning, which we link to career opportunities as higher qualifications often unlock broader prospects.	Autumn 2
The focus is on preparing for the workplace, including interview techniques, understanding what employers look for in candidates, and exploring entrepreneurship and how innovation shapes different industries.	Spring 1

Year 10	When
Students explore budgeting and the advantages and disadvantages of different types of employment contracts.	Summer 2

Year 11	When
Students focus on developing their personal statements, understanding CVs, and exploring key employability traits.	Autumn 1
The focus shifts to financial literacy, including handling money, choosing financial services, understanding credit, and interpreting payslips.	Autumn 2
